
Worship of the Divine continues on a weekly basis whether there is clergy present or not. Ministry for the people within the pews and the ones outside the doors continues and does not wither on the vine. God has called this place into being and sustains it to be a light for all to see or experience.

In a few weeks, another page of history will be turned and a new page will be presented to be filled with the continued presence of the living God. For the last 10-1/2 years I have been privileged to coordinate that history that has been recorded, always praying that the congregation will continue to fill the pages for years to come with their new leadership.

My ponderings this month are about what I have been privileged to experience as I have pastorally cared for Trinity and its people. Forgive me for sounding boastful but what is written here is a witness of the work of the Holy Spirit at Trinity.



We have moved to a "Hands on Approach" when it comes to Outreach. To add to the existing Food Closet and Annual Book Sale, we saw the creation of the Monday Feeding program, the involvement with Old Man Rivers in the distribution of food to the homeless, Thanksgiving and Christmas Baskets, and the Snack Sack ministry to McKinley School. We have adopted the Monthly Outreach Project envelopes earmarking funds collected for local, diocesan and world outreach activities. We formed a Relay For Life Team to show the community our support to fight Cancer.




When it came to Education, we provided Sunday School and a Youth Group for the children of Trinity as well as sponsoring several years of Vacation Bible School held both in the summer and at Thanksgiving break time. We had quarterly youth day events that included education as well as recreation and always included an arm of Outreach beyond ourselves. And to include them in worship we trained them as acolytes and lectors. For several years we had a viable Adult Education class and continue to have a vibrant, healthy weekly Bible Study



In the Music Department we experienced the change of organists/ choir Directors to arriving at the place financially where we have a Choir Director and an Organist. We saw the development of the Music Scholars program and the presentation of some Choral Evensongs and special music presentations.



Within the congregation we have developed a Knitting Ministry for the creation of prayer shawls for the ill and infant items for newborns at the local hospital. For our education and fellowship, the annual Seder Meal was a prominent part of Holy Week and the women of Trinity had an opportunity to fellowship at the Advent Tea.



And we cannot forget the awesome experience we had with The Rev. Josh Saxe as our Curate. For the congregation, this was a huge step in faith as well as financially; yet it was what the Holy Spirit decided for us to do and experience. We were able to mentor him into his priesthood and experience the gift of seeing him grow and to be called as the Rector of St. James'-Lewisburg.



I am so thankful for that call in early July 2004 from Senior Warden Terry Cauthorn with the words:


"We are calling you to be the Rector of Trinity Church-Parkersburg."

I am thankful that the Holy Spirit nudged me to say "Yes."





Jr. Warden's Report

It won't be long until work commences on the roofing project. According to the contractor, the shingle roof will be removed and replaced first, followed by replacement of the flat roof.

Speaking of leaky roofs, approximately two weeks ago, the fire inspector was doing a tour through the buildings and discovered leaks on the third floor of the office building. The roofing on the dormers on the south and east sides of the building had some rather large holes which allowed water to soak through the plaster, creating quite a mess. I was out of town and after calling Larry Tucker, he went up to the third floor to check the damage. Water was still leaking through the roofing during the time he was there and he was able to create a trough to catch the remaining drips. Fortunately, our roofing contractor came the next day and placed a temporary patch on the dormer roofs. Our contractor notified me recently that he had ordered a special material to permanently repair the problem areas when work begins on the other roofing.

As you may know or not know, we have entered into a contract to have the nave of the church painted. Plaster will be repaired and all of the areas will be skim coated with a material which will make the walls smooth again. The work is expected to commence in the latter part of August or early September and will require approximately three weeks to complete. It has been several years since the interior received a face lift.

On another matter, Bernard Bookman has checked out the wiring to the lighting in Trevor Chapel. It has been more than ten years since that area has been lit during services and just as long since the rose window and the stained glass panels have been lit at night. In his investigation, he found that all of the bulbs were burned out! Along with that, a few sockets were inoperable. The good news is that the two circuits operating those lights are still in working order. A new timer has been installed and a few lights have been replaced until permanent changes are made. We are going to install a new type of energy efficient fixture which will light up those areas for a fraction of the cost using just four lighting fixtures instead of twelve flood lights. Bernard has highly recommended these new fixtures because these lights, which are extremely bright, will allow us to once again light the chapel area during services and show off our beautiful stained glass at night. Last, but certainly not least, St. Anne's Guild has graciously committed \$1500 toward completing upgrades in the kitchen. Many thanks to Terry Cauthorn and Guild members for their generosity.

LOSS and the GRIEVING PROCESS

Loss and **grief** are part of the **process of living** for all of us. It is sometimes felt by the **very young** as well as those of us in our **golden years**. We at Trinity have experienced losses this year and will face more losses and we all will grieve those losses in different ways.

These losses could be any one of the following: death of our priest, husband, father or other family member or friend; death of one of our patients; death of our horse, dog, cat or other pet; loss of a dear life-long friend who has moved away from the area; loss of a job; loss of one's previous physical or mental ability due to disease or the aging process; loss of a spouse due to divorce; temporary loss of our child who has gone off to college and so many other losses in our lives.

Trinity will soon be experiencing the loss of our rector of ten years, Father Larry and his wife Jean. They have been **integral parts** of our church family. Father Larry's retirement is a positive situation for he and Jean, a time to rest from schedules and time to visit more with family and friends. I imagine this is also a loss for them.

So how do we all **grieve** these losses? I have always followed The Nursing Theorist, Sister Callista Roy in my practice, especially with loss. Roy's Theory of Adaptation concerns **adaptive** and **maladaptive behaviors**. Life is a continual **ADAPTATION** to different life situations. **Adaptive** behaviors for the grieving process might be prayer, discussion, journaling and for a while maybe crying, anger, seclusion, sleeplessness, loss of appetite and so on. Some **maladaptive** behaviors might be use of alcohol, sleep deprivation, significant weight loss, incessant crying, uncontrollable anger.

We all have **feelings** during these times. Feelings are neither good nor bad. It is **healthy** or **adaptive** to realize these feelings. Sometimes we are angry with a person who has left us or even feel anger at God. God knows our feelings and remains with us supporting us through these difficult times. So be angry, cry, journal, discuss or do whatever is adaptive behavior for grieving **that works for you**.

If you get **STUCK** in the grieving process and find yourself using maladaptive/unhealthy behaviors please consider reaching out to a clergy member at Trinity, your healthcare provider or your parish nurse.

Loss and **grief** are part of the process of living. We all experience loss and grief, and hopefully we will all come out healthy in these processes.
