Padre's Ponderings

The Sacrament of The Reconciliation of a Penitent

As we continue on our Spiritual Pilgrimage through Lent, I want to share with you a Spiritual discipline that is available in our Church but is one that has almost lost its value due to the anxiety it creates in individuals. The source of the anxiety is two-fold in my opinion: [1] It reminds us too much of the Roman Catholic Church of the requirement of

making a Confession and [2] one finds the act


of sharing with a priest their sins that need healed awkward or something they do not know how to do. In fact, many Episcopalians forget that The Reconcili-

ation of a Penitent is a Sacrament of our Church.

I would highly recommend that everyone open a Prayer Book to page 446 and first read the rubrics or directions and then read through the actual service of Reconciliation. The Reconciliation of a Penitent is available to all but not required of any. Many will say that we have a corporate Reconciliation during the Confession and Absolution during the Communion service so why the need for a private Confession? My response is that there are times when a corporate Confession just does not clear the heart and conscience. There are times when a sin or deed that needs some special counseling to be cleared just can't be accomplished in a corporate setting.

There are just times when it is necessary to openly share that area which is a stumbling block of having a clear relationship with God due to an act of ourselves or someone towards us. As heard in The Exhortation, there may be times when one needs to receive the benefit of absolution, and spiritual counsel and advice to actually experience the forgiveness of God.

So, please take a moment during this Lenten Pilgrimage to look over this Sacrament of Reconciliation and to be more aware of what is available to you. If you need to talk, please feel free to contact me and ask your questions or have a conversation about this Sacrament.



Recently, I introduced an idea of a Spiritual Discipline of seeking for the closest moment you have had to Christ. Some people attempt to do this on a daily basis while for others a weekly review is a good start. This action is to set aside a day when you reflect back over the week's activities of life and search for that moment when you felt a close, intimate time with Christ during a certain time of your life. The closest moments come in all shapes and sizes but they are there if we would search them out.

I find it helpful to write them down so I can reread them especially when I JUST KNOW that Christ was no where near me during a week. It never fails that in the rereading, I am reminded of a time when He was actually there, probably carrying me through stuff. This moment does not have to have been a mountaintop experience but may be just the touch of Christ when I most needed it and did not realize it.

Again, I am available for discussion on this Spiritual Discipline; just contact me. May your Lenten pilgrimage be special and holy so that Easter is the joyous celebration that it must be. Remember I am praying for you all daily.

Good-bye, Father Jack!

The Rev. Jack D. Neilson passed into his next life on Jan. 29, 2015. By his side was his beloved wife of over 66 years, two daughters and close clergy colleagues. An important part of the life of Trinity since 1981, Jack's loss is deeply felt by all, as evidenced by the large turnout at the service February 7 celebrating Jack's life. In Father Art's Words of Comfort at the service, he told of many lengthy theological discussions with local clergy where Jack's comment would be "that's fine, but how does that help the person

hurting in the pew?" Father Art said, "Jack loved people—you and me".

A glimpse into Jack's thoughts can possibly be provided by a plaque he had on his desk since the 1960s:

"It isn't the mountains ahead that wear you out, it's the grain of sand in your shoe."

Parishioners expressed their love for him: "I count it as a gift from God to have known Fr Jack. He truly was an inspiration to me" and "We have lost a great and gentle man. Our lives have been blessed by his life with us, but now he has received his well-deserved reward."






Remembering the Rev. Jack D. Neilson


What a blessing to have had Jack Neilson on this earth for eighty eight years. Jack came among us here in Parkersburg when I was Rector of Trinity Church. I knew him as a parishioner who, as a successful businessman, simultaneously became a student, scoring among the highest on the ordination exams in his class. I worked with him as a deacon, a priest and especially a close associate. But, regardless of the title or role, one thing never changed about Jack, he was one of the kindest, most generous and most selfsacrificing human beings I have ever known.



Once, Jack went out of his way to make sure a popular, but scarce toy— A Pound Puppy was sent to us by Greyhound bus from some distant Penney's store on Christmas Eve so it could appear under our tree the next day. This same generous soul also never failed to tell me if he observed something I was neglecting and needed to be doing as the Rector of this church! By the way, he was almost always right.

Jack was one of those rare clerics who never sought glory for himself, but always seemed to be there for others. Jack was hard to embarrass (although giving him a belly dancer for his birthday about pushed the limit). He easily moved from one role to another, being a no-nonsense store manager in the daytime and a shady detective on the Actors Guild stage in the evening, while making a sick call or two between those two times, even if it meant changing his collar in the car.

Jack was a family man through and through. All of the children save Ingrid had left home by the time our paths crossed, but the successful people those children have become is proof in the pudding. As a parent, I have always envied the way he provided a stern but loving positive example for his kids.



I am grateful that Mariann and I could return to join Jack and Lynette as they celebrated their 65th anniversary and thank the children for including us. We regret not being physically present today, but please know that your family is in our prayers.

I pray also for the people of Trinity Church and for Bishop Klusmeyer and the people of the Diocese of West Virginia. Jack's death leaves a big hole in your life, but think how much richer you are for his having been a laborer in your vineyard.

May the glory and heavenly strength that has surrounded Jack throughout his life and ministry shine brightly this day as we praise God for now receiving this faithful servant into God's nearer kingdom.



Statement, reviewed the budget, assigned Functional Areas, and inspected some facility areas of concerns. Positive fellowship was had by all.

As we enter the year, I'm confident we are on strong fiscal footing. However, we will be challenged by some facility items such as Trinity Hall renovation, kitchen flat roof replacement, and improvements to the office building. I fully support our Junior Warden, Dan Thomas and would appreciate your support, time, and energy for him. Dan will be bringing these and other items before the Vestry and the church as a whole.

In addition to the facility improvements, we have divided into seven other **Functional Areas** to better serve you. Should you have a need or recommendation, I would highly encourage you to contact any Vestry Member or myself.



For me, this has been a busy year serving as Jr. Warden and it's only February. As you may or may not know, Larry Tucker and I installed a hand washing station in the kitchen next to

the prep sink. This station will help bring our kitchen closer to meeting Health Department standards. Two new stainless steel table top/dish cabinets have been ordered and should arrive before the end of February. These tabletop/cabinets will also help us meet Health Department standards. Other changes to the kitchen are also planned. Bids are now being taken to replace the kitchen roof and other flat roofs close to Trinity Hall. As soon as the roof is replaced, new smooth surface ceiling tiles will replace the existing tiles in the kitchen.


Of special note is the fact that bids are now being taken to repair and paint the plaster walls of the sanctuary. It has been four decades or more since a complete repair and painting of the walls has taken place. Portions of the plaster in the sanctuary are cracked and loose. Frequently, large paint and plaster chips have been found on the floor in Trevor Chapel. Plaster is also loose in the altar area of the sanctuary as well.

Finally, plans are now underway to completely renovate Trinity Hall. Mike Rauh, Mike Cameron and I have spent a good bit of time addressing many items related to the renovation. Mike Rauh has taken several pictures of the original Hall ceiling and found that the supporting structure appears to be strong even though it is well over one hundred years old. We are also looking at making alterations to the hall with respect to the stage and storage areas. Maintaining the stage and storage areas is important, but proposed changes will make these areas even more user friendly. The men's bathroom off the Hall will occupy a smaller space and will probably be located more toward the ramp area. The former bathroom area would

then become an extension of the storage area located near the northwest doors (toward the Smoot Theatre) of the Hall.

More info about all of these projects will be coming your way.

Don't forget to 'spring forward'



Padre Jack impacted many lives, not only at Trinity but also in the community. Like so many others, I was able to experience first hand how he ministered. Fortunately, I was privileged to sometimes drive Fr. Jack to those hospitalized and /or homebound . Through this experience I was able to assist him more as his vision declined.

Pastoral Care was Father Jack's forte. He would tell me, "Marion, I'm ready to go anytime, except Mondays" (Rotary Meetings) "or Wednesdays" (Priests Bible Study Group).

Parish Nursing became a ministry for me when I retired as a family nurse practitioner. Fr Larry was also interested at that time to have parish nursing in his congregation. Although I had pastoral care in my WVU education for parish nursing, I felt led to take the Pastoral Care /Eucharistic Visitor course through The Episcopal Diocese of WV. Through his example, Fr Jack reinforced in me what I had learned.

- 1) He always **limited the time of the visit** so not to fatigue the parishioner.
- 2) The visit was always **focused on the parishioner**.
- He would bring up memories in the persons past so **THEY could reminisce**. Such a healthy intervention, especially for those in our "golden" years.
- 4) Prayer and delivering the body and blood of Christ was done with reverence.
- 5) He always gave those he visited that **broad smile of his**, when they asked him to return. He **brightened their days**.

Two other personal notes. Once, I said to Jack, "Jack, you deal amazingly well with all your physical problems." Jack responded with "Marion, we just deal with what we're dealt"! GOOD ADVICE, JACK. I also had shared with him that I sometimes get distracted during church service. He shared with me that church service is only between him and God. Since hearing that, when I get distracted I look at the stained glass window of Jesus and am once redirected to my God. THANK YOU, dear Lord, for Fr. Jack's presence in our lives.
