I have been asked what's next for me. I dunno. I will keep reflecting on those four



Father Mackey's Orders Received

When a clergyperson from another denomination comes into the Episcopal Church, if he or she has been ordained by a bishop in the "historic succession" of bishops, they are not re-ordained. Rather, after careful inquiry and fulfilling the canonical requirements, the priest has their orders "received" into the Episcopal Church and the Anglican Communion. This is the case with our new rector, Fr. Geoffrey Mackey.

Though he grew up in the Episcopal Church, Fr. Geoff was ordained by a Catholic bishop in the Byzantine Rite. On April 23, 2024 Bishop Cowden formally received his sacramental priesthood with the words: "Upon these promises, I admit you to the exercise of the office of priest in this Church, recognizing your authority to preach the word of God and to celebrate the Holy Mysteries. God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit continue to bless you and God's people through your ministry. Amen." The reception took place during a service of Holy Baptism and Holy Eucharist held at historic Olde Saint John's Episcopal Church in Colliers, where Fr. Mackey's parents attend.

At the conclusion of the Liturgy, Bishop Cowden asked Fr. Geoff to pronounce the blessing. He used the words of the Epistle to the Hebrews:

"May the God of peace, who brought again from the dead our Lord Jesus Christ, the great Shepherd of the sheep, by the blood of the eternal covenant, make you perfect in every good work to do his will, working in you that which is well-pleasing in his sight. And the blessing of God Almighty, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, be upon you this night and remain with you always. Amen."

Highlights from April Vestry meeting

- The Treasurer reviewed the March financial reports and reported that the church's financial condition remains strong. The Diocesan Managed Trust Funds have increased over \$81,000 in value since the beginning of the year.
- The DRE wants to start advertising the Peterkin camp schedule and letting families know that scholarship funds are available to help with the costs.
- Anne Deputy discussed several fundraising opportunities to raise funds for outreach, including collecting ink and toner cartridges and dine and order events at local restaurants. Anne and Mickie Richardson have also started a greeting card outreach program for local healthcare facilities.
- The Building & Grounds Committee reported that Canterbury Electric will be repairing the damaged chandelier in the Nave and checking and securing all the other chandeliers.
- There will be one service on May 5th at 10:30 a.m. to celebrate Fr. Charles' last weekend with us. Fr. Geoffrey's first services will be on May 18th and 19th.

The Book Sale News

The annual Trinity Episcopal Church book sale will begin accepting donations June 5. "We appreciate the effort our donors make to bring their books to us, and know they want their contributions to count," said Lynn Fury, book sale chairperson. "Over the years, we have noted what books sell, and what has to be disposed of after the sale. Donors can help tremendously by first weeding-out unsalable materials."

Before carting their books to the church, patrons can ask themselves three questions to make sure their donations are on target.

Is this book the right type?

Typically, books by popular authors and current best-selling titles in hardback or paperback get snapped up quickly at the Trinity fundraising sale. Nonfiction histories and classic novels in good condition also find ready buyers. Cookbooks remain traditional favorites, but only in regular sizes; no small booklets or pamphlets.

"Reader interests have shifted over time," Fury said. "In the past, every family with a child wanted a set of encyclopedias. Now you can't give them away." While current books generally sell better than aged editions, certain types qualify as prized "gems." Trinity gems are any West Virginia history, yearbooks, hardcover pictorial "coffee table" books, or pre-1940 books.

Donors can pre-screen their own selections and remove unsaleable materials:

· No encyclopedias · No dictionaries, reference or textbooks · No magazines or pamphlets · No Readers Digest condensed books

Is this book in good condition?

Even the most avid reader is likely to pass over a book that reeks of mildew. Before putting a book in your donation box, give it the eye and sniff tests:

· No moldy or musty odors · No dirty or torn covers · No pages falling out

Is this outdated?

New developments can quickly make information out-of-date, especially in fields such as technology, sciences, travel and psychology. Check the publication date in your books to determine whether they remain current.

- No outdated (before 2014) materials on topics vulnerable to quick "information expiration" such as technology, self-help or travel
- No cassette or VHS tapes. However, the Trinity sale organizers still accept vinyl records and compact discs (CDs).

Volunteers will start accepting donations on Wed., June 5 from 10:30 a.m.-noon, in Trinity Hall. Donations will be received every Wed. through Sept. 4, except when other church events require use of the hall.

The 2024 book sale will be held October 2 - 5

Hours are 9 a.m. - 6 p.m. Oct. 2 - 4 and 9 a.m.-noon on Sat., Oct. 5.


