A note from Fr. Geoff



Dear Sisters and Brothers,

This past week, since Easter Sunday, I've been thinking about two things. One is the passing away of Pope Francis. The Pope is not only the spiritual leader of 1.4 billion Catholics worldwide, but also someone who is often looked up to ecumenically as a spiritual and moral guide. Whatever else historians might someday write about Francis and his pontificate, it was clearly marked by an openness to the poor and disenfranchised and a willingness to "go to the margins" of society in service of the Gospel.

Also during this past Easter Week, on one of our sunny weekdays, one of our staff members looked out the window and saw, in our courtyard, a homeless gentleman napping in the warmth of the sun. He did not stay long - just enough to catch a few winks. When this was related to me later, it immediately reminded me of something I had noticed on a visit to the Vatican a few years ago.

In St. Peter's Square - I noticed something remarkably different from any other landmark or tourist site I've been to. When evening falls in Rome, around Bernini's magnificent Tuscan Colonnades, which reach out like arms from the Basilica, the area is filled with tents and sleeping bags as those without housing prepare for the night. Thinking of the other landmarks I've been to, they have all sought to "clean up" the area. I cannot imagine seeing a homeless person sleeping under the Eiffel Tower, or at the foot of the Space Needle, or in the Lincoln Memorial. But those in Rome who have nowhere else to go, are welcomed into the arms of the Church.

I will be celebrating my first year as your Rector this month on May 15. And one of the ele-

Those who cannot see Christ in the poor are atheists indeed. - Dorothy Day ments of our parish life that attracted me to this place was your care for the needy. Our Monday feeding program is an excellent example of Christian hospitality which asks no questions of the stranger but that he or she come, sit down, and receive without cost. I have also seen how members of our congregation interact with and welcome the needy when they come to our doors on Sunday mornings or throughout the week. Our Lord has explicitly identified himself with those who are homeless, hungry, and in need. The Gospel of Matthew recounts that, on the day of judgment, Christ the King will say: "Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me" and "whatever you did not do for one of the least of these, you did not do for me" (Mt. 25.40, 45). And the author of the Epistle to the Hebrews encourages us: "Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for thereby some have entertained angels unawares" (13.2).

My dear friends in Christ: one of the surest ways we can show that we are the disciples of Jesus Christ is by how we welcome "the other." The New Testament word used for this hospitality is "xenophilia" - that is, "love of the stranger or foreigner." It is the opposite of the word "xenophobia" which is the fear of the other.

Some Suggested Books on Prayer

In early April, we held an ECW-sponsored Quiet Day here at the church. The topic for the morning was Prayer. Out of that event has come a lot of good fruit and I thought that, rather than a book review this month, I would suggest a few books on prayer that I have found valuable.

- Prayer for Beginners by Peter Kreeft (Ignatius Press, 2000) This wonderful little book is ideal for those who feel that they have not progressed very far in their spiritual life, but it has wisdom for those who have been praying their whole lives. It is short, accessible, easy to read, and practical.
- The Lord's Prayer: A Guide to Praying to Our Father by Wes Hill (Lexham Press, 2019) A phrase-by-phrase guide to understanding the Prayer that Jesus taught us.
- On the Invocation of the Name of Jesus by Lev Gillet (Template, 1985) Written by a monk of the Eastern Church, this book was sponsored by the Fellowship of St. Alban and St. Sergius, an association of Anglicans and Orthodox together. It is a practical guide to praying the Jesus Prayer or the Prayer of the Heart - which is none other than the frequent and intentional invocation of the Holy Name.
- *Prayer: Encounter with the Living God* by Hilarion Alfeyev (SVS Press, 2015)
 Orthodox Metropolitan Hilarion goes through several practical considerations on personal prayer.
- *Prayer in Practice* by Simon Tugwell (Template, 1974)
 The most in-depth of the books listed here, this is a classic on the subject by a Roman Catholic Dominican friar. Like the Kreeft and Alfayev books above, the chapters are based on practical considerations, but his treatment is much more in-depth.
